Tuesday, June 25

Depart USA for Edinburgh

North American travelers board overnight flights to Edinburgh (EDI), arriving on Wednesday, June 26.

Thursday, June 27

Stirling · Falkirk

Come visit Stirling Castle, where Scottish kings and queens were coronated beginning in the 12th century. Strategically situated on a craggy hill, the castle witnessed 60 years of conflict during the War for Scottish Independence and also was the hiding place of Mary, Queen of Scots when the English King Henry VIII wanted her to marry his son. Our visit will include the Stirling Tapestries, the tranquil gardens, and the Royal Palace of James V.

Following lunch, we'll visit the Falkirk Wheel, where engineers combined ancient and modern technologies to create a rotating boat lift to reconnect Glasgow with Edinburgh. Then it's on to The Kelpies, sculptures of the beasts of Scottish lore that stand as a reminder of the horse-powered heritage of the traditional canal.

Friday, June 28

Roslin · Abbotsford · Innerleithen

Originally built in 1456 for the celebration of Catholic Mass, Rosslyn Chapel, following the Scottish Reformation of 1560, is now a place of worship for the Scottish Episcopal Church. This chapel displays the intricate carvings of the Lady Chapel, dozens of carved "green men," and the traditional medieval crypt.

On the banks of the River Tweed, Sir Walter Scott built the picturesque and whimsical Abbotsford House, complete with detailed and colorful gardens. Scott's extensive library held great inspiration and includes gifts from the Brothers Grimm and Washington Irving. His armory displays the great collection of artifacts he collected—the swords, helmets, suits of armor, and other accoutrements of a Highland warrior.

Following lunch, we'll visit Traquair House, Scotland's oldest inhabited residence. Visited by 27 Scottish kings and queens, Traquair dates to 1107 and has been lived in by the Stuart family since 1491. In the original tower you can see the bed where Mary slept and the original stair that became part of the secret escape route for Catholic priests in times of terror. Below the chapel is a microbrewery utilizing the original equipment and fermenting ales in the 200-year-old oak casks.

This optional prelude includes two hotel nights, two full breakfasts at our respective hotels, all entry fees, professional guides, air-conditioned motorcoach transportation, tips to drivers, guides, and hotel porters. Friday, June 28

Edinburgh

From the Edinburgh airport, hop in a taxi for transfer to your hotel located in Old Town. Depending on your category of cabin on the ship, you will enjoy a stay at *The Principal Hotel at Charlotte Square*, *The Glasshouse*, or the *Marriott* on Baxter's Place.

Providing your flight schedule allows, you may have some free time this afternoon to explore "Old Town." The oldest section of Edinburgh features a medieval street plan and narrow, steep alleyways wandering in the shadow of Edinburgh Castle. All of Old Town is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Tonight we meet fellow travelers at *The Glasshouse Hotel* for a Welcome Reception.

Saturday, June 29

Edinburgh · Embarkation

Following a full breakfast, we'll partake of a private opening of Edinburgh Castle. Perched on the mount of an extinct volcano, this medieval fortress lays claim to being the most besieged place in Britain. Pause in St. Margaret's Chapel, the oldest building in the castle, for a brief moment of reflection. Fellow believers have prayed in this same place since the 12th century!

Strolling downhill from the castle through Old Town's "Royal Mile," we witness St. Giles' Cathedral, the house of the reformer John Knox, and High Kirk of St. Giles, the church where he preached. Following lunch and souvenir shopping, we'll transfer to the port of Leith to visit the most famous ship in the world—the Royal Yacht *Britannia*. Follow in the footsteps of world leaders such as Sir Winston Churchill and Nelson Mandela, stepping aboard the royal yacht and discovering what life was like on board Her Majesty's floating Royal residence.

Even the Royal Yacht is frankly out-classed whenever the port is graced by the regal silhouette of our very own tall ship—the elegant SEA CLOUD II. The Captain, his officers, and crew welcome us with smiles and chilled champagne. Within the hour, the lines are loosed. The anchor is hoisted. We're underway. Raise your glass to eight exciting days of "fair winds and following seas." And with YOUNG LIFE, we're always guaranteed a fun group of fellow shipmates!



Sunday, June 30

Dundee · Camp Cairn Brae

YOUNG LIFE effectively engages the transformative nature of the summer camp experience to share the good news of the gospel with nearly 120,000 teens each summer. Real and thrilling fun is combined with hearing the message of Christ in terms young people can understand. Scotland's YOUNG LIFE Camp, Cairn Brae, is located on Loch Monzievaird in the Scottish Highlands. Today we can remember our own summer camp experiences and visit this idyllic, forty-acre location in the heart of Scotland. A delicious camp lunch is included!

When we arrive back in Dundee, those of us who are invigorated by the fresh air of camp may choose to visit the new Victoria & Albert Design Museum and the Royal Research Ship *Discovery*. If some would like to return to the ship to relax on the deck, we will deliver you to the quay. Launched in 1901, The *RRS Discovery*, under the command of Captain Robert Falcon Scott, sailed to the unknown regions of the Antarctic. There the ship and crew spent two years in the ice and were prompted to return home after suffering from snow blindness, frostbite, and early symptoms of scurvy. Among *Discovery's* crew was young Ernest Shackleton, who later returned to the Antarctic wilderness aboard his own ship, *Endurance*.

Opening in fall 2018, the Victoria & Albert Design Museum is the only V&A museum in the world outside London. Inspired by the dramatic cliffs along the east coast of Scotland, the structure stands at the center of a £1 billion transformation of Dundee's waterfront. The V&A will feature permanent galleries of Scottish design, as well as an international program of changing exhibitions showcasing the best design from around the world.

Royal Research Ship Discovery





Tuesday, July 2

Invergordon

Following breakfast we'll depart the ship and head northward through breathtaking Highland scenery for Dunrobin Castle, the ancestral home of the Clan Sutherland, where we'll be treated to a specially arranged early opening of the castle and gardens.

With fairytale spires and turrets, Dunrobin Castle rises above the North Sea like a storybook illustration. There are few places that match the mountains, moors, and beaches of Sutherland—the combination of color and texture is quite magical. History housed here begins with the original castle keep erected in the early 13th century and echoes through the 189 rooms.

Before departing, we'll gather on the castle lawn for the spectacular falconry show, featuring peregrines and golden eagles, both residents in the Highlands. Andy Hughes, the castle's resident Falconer, will explain the hunting methods used by owls, hawks, and falcons with fascinating aerobatic displays. What a privilege to observe this ancient art.

We will return to the ship for another delicious spread followed by an opportunity to attend YOUNG LIFE Club!

Monday, July 1

At Sea

Today we navigate the Pentland Firth and sail at 58° north latitude, the same as Alaska. Assuming the winds cooperate, we hope to be under sail for most of the day...engines quiet...the only noises are the peaceful creaking of lines and sails. Wise world travelers pace themselves. In all of our itineraries, we try to include at least one restful day completely at sea.

Following breakfast, join the ship's Chief Mate on the aft deck for an as-it-happens explanation of setting sails. If the winds are what we hope, experienced crew members will climb aloft, setting 23 sails and 32,000 square feet of canvas above our heads. After lunch, find a quiet nook or explore the four decks of this romantic tall ship with modern comforts.

Wednesday, July 3

Isle of Lewis . Stornoway

This morning we take a coach ride across the Isle of Lewis to visit two historical sites of the Hebrides. The Blackhouse at Arnol gives special insight into traditional island life in Lewis. Once the residence of a Hebridean crafting family and their animals, this blackhouse is preserved almost as the family left it. A peat fire burns in the open hearth with the smoke filtering out through the roof. A blackhouse was generally built with double dry-stone walls packed with earth and roofed with wooden rafters covered with a thatch of turf or reed. The Arnol Blackhouse is clearly erected to survive in the tough winters of the Outer Hebrides.

Located on the west coast of Lewis, the 5,000-year-old Callanish Stones are famous all over the world. The stones predate England's famous Stonehenge monument and were an important place for ritual activity for at least 2,000 years. Patrick Ashmore, who excavated at Callanish in the early 1980s writes: "The most attractive explanation... is that every 18.6 years, the moon skims especially low over the southern hills. It seems to dance along the stones. Knowledge and prediction of this heavenly event gave earthly authority to those who watched the skies."

Thursday, July 4

Isle of Iona

On America's Independence Day we celebrate the freedom found only in Christ by visiting one of the oldest and most important sites of Christian worship in the western world.

The Abbey at Iona was a focal point for the spread of Christianity throughout Scotland with a monastic community first founded by St. Columba around 563. Iona contains the largest and most important collection of early sacred sculpture in all of Britain, including spectacular high crosses such as St. Martin's, which has stood for 1250 years. Iona was the popular burial place of the best men of the clans, their graves covered by more than 100 beautifully carved slabs.

In the evening, our approach to the Isle of Staffa (Pillar Island) by sea is breathtaking. Great basalt columns created by the steady cooling of lava flows flank the deep caves. Seabirds dominate the wildlife on the island. In addition to guillemots, razorbills, and great northern divers, a large colony of puffins breed on Staffa every summer.

Perhaps Mendelssohn came closest to capturing the magic of Staffa in his *Hebrides Overture*. While we circle the island, our first-class ship will set the mood and broadcast Mendelssohn's epic musical tone poem for our enjoyment.



Friday, July 5

Londonderry, Northern Ireland



Londonderry

Known as “Derry” by those who prefer to drop the anglicized part of their official name, this city is the only completely intact walled city remaining in Ireland. The walls were built in 1613–1619 by The Honorable Irish Society as defenses for early 17th-century settlers from England and Scotland. Our walking tour of the city will take us along the tops of the walls for views of a splendid city crammed full of history and heritage.

From Derry we will board our motorcoaches for a coastal drive to Giant's Causeway, Northern Ireland's first UNESCO Heritage Site. Giant's Causeway is a geological wonder and home to a wealth of history and legend. The 40,000 basalt stone columns left by ancient volcanic eruptions inspire visitors. Legend has it that these strange octagonal columns of stone were molded by the Giant Finn McCool so he could walk across the sea to his love in Scotland. State-of-the-art interpretation within the award-winning visitor center unlocks the mystery of this natural wonder and offers a unique glimpse into the marvel that is the Giant's Causeway. Visitors can explore marked trails and enjoy spectacular coastal scenery.

Saturday, July 6

Belfast

This morning we will visit Titanic Belfast. The museum's four wings are designed to look like high-tech ships' hulls, covered in silver anodized aluminum shards. It opened in 2012 to commemorate the centenary of the sinking of the Belfast-built ship (though the locals say, "It was all right when it left here"). The exhibits are impressively detailed, from the recreated staterooms to the personal histories of builders, waitresses, and guests. Don't miss the compelling exhibits that describe life in Belfast's linen mills at the turn of the century.

We will take advantage of our extended day in Belfast and partake of lunches packed from the ship's larder while visiting Belfast's Botanic Gardens, followed by a visit to C. S. Lewis Square and a walk among inspiring sculptures from the author's most famous work, *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*. Before retuning to our majestic ship for our Captain's Farewell Dinner, we will join YOUNG LIFE of Belfast for a city-wide Club!

Sunday, July 7

Dublin

This morning we come to port in the capital city of Ireland and exchange our final goodbyes at breakfast with the crew and fellow YOUNG LIFE passengers. For our guests who are returning home today, an airport shuttle will be provided to Dublin airport (DUB). But we do invite all to continue for a two-day exploration of Dublin.

Sunday, July 7

Visiting Dublin would not be complete without a stop at Trinity College to view the impressive 7th-century Book of Kells. This painstakingly illustrated Latin manuscript of the Gospels is a treasure of our Christian heritage. For this visit we will pre-book fast-track tickets and avoid queueing.

Next, we'll stop at the National Museum of Ireland. Discover the breathtaking Celtic Gold collection and other treasures of important Irish historic milestones. Our final stop is St. Patrick's Cathedral, a glorious Norman Cathedral where Jonathan Swift was Dean when he wrote *Gulliver's Travels*.

After checking in to either the traditionally elegant *Merrion Hotel* or the contemporary *Marker Hotel*, we will partake in the Irish spectacle of Riverdance at the beautiful Gaiety Theatre. This show is truly an experience of energy, precision, and Irish passion.




Monday, July 8

Those returning home today will be provided transportation this morning to the airport in Dublin.

We begin our excursion through the County of Wicklow, known as the garden of Ireland. The epitome of rugged, romantic Ireland, Glendalough is a beautiful valley with two lakes where St. Kevin founded a monastery in the 6th century. Remains of the location include a church, Round Tower, and cemetery in the most evocative setting.

Our return takes us through Enniskerry, one of the prettiest villages in Ireland, lying in a wooded hollow among the hills close to Powerscourt House and Gardens. Wonderful herbaceous borders, rose gardens, and Italian statuary stretching over 47 acres offers a sublime blend of formal gardens, sweeping terraces, ornamental lakes, secret hollows, and rambling walks. Last year, the gardens earned the distinction of 3rd-best garden in the world by *National Geographic*! We will return to the center of Dublin by mid-afternoon with plenty of time to shop and wander along the cobbled streets.




